






### What is the project? •••

Connecting Woodside will make it easier and safer to travel around by foot and bike, transforming the area into a more attractive and accessible place for all.

This will be achieved by improving the look, feel and function of streets and public spaces, and reducing the negative impacts of traffic volume and speed. The expected outcomes of the project will also include health and environmental benefits for all people living in and visiting Woodside.

#### **Great places**

Shaping places people can be proud of, making Woodside a more attractive place to live and visit.



## Well-connected, quiet routes

A network of routes made up of quiet streets which are pleasant and safe to walk and cycle, supporting people in their everyday journeys.



## Fully segregated cycle tracks

Improving safety for everyone using the street, with great public transport integration and connections beyond Woodside.



## Encouraging walking + cycling


At least 5% of the project budget will go to activities and projects which encourage people to walk and cycle.

# Part 1 of a 20mph zone rolled out



Part 1 of the 20mph zone has been rolled out east of Maryhill Road. This is one of several measures to make sure Woodside is a place where people feel safe and comfortable making their everyday journeys. Part 2 will cover the rest of the project area.





# What is a Quietway?

- A safe, pleasant, convenient, quieter route within the project area which offers an alternative to busy main roads
- They provide a connection for pedestrians and cyclists to destinations and major streets within the project area
- A nice place to pass through, with improvements to the quality of the streets to reprioritise them in favour of people walking and cycling







'Mini Plazas' - Blocked up street ends enhanced and turned into small squares









## What you told us...

Because it is so wide, drivers tend to speed along it

Interventions should include trees and planting to bring air quality, biodiversity and other environmental benefits.

> Make side streets accessible with dropped kerbs

The pavement and drainage could be improved, particularly on the south side

## Ideas on how we could improve the street...



Raised tables with build outs - slow traffic and create informal crossing points



Visual Narrowing (colour) - helps to narrow the road and reduce speeds




Cycle friendly speed humps – reduce vehicle speed and allow cyclists clear path





# What you told us...


Most drivers treat it as a straight route ignoring the priority of any cars or bikes coming from North Woodside Rd

Compact Roundabout -


- Sideways deflection to slow traffic


## North Woodside Road & Braid Square






# St George's Road in Context





## Why both Segregated Routes and Quietways?

- The character of the road and the vehicle speed and volume determine whether segregated cycle routes are Quietways are most appropriate.
- Segregated cycle routes are being proposed where traffic speeds and volumes are higher, and additional protection is required to encourage more people to cycle.
- A Quietway approach is being used where traffic speeds and volumes are low to create safe, pleasant, and convenient routes, with improvements to the quality of the streets to reprioritise them in favour of people walking and cycling.







## What you told us...

Add a pedestrian crossing over the Slip road from St George's Road to GWR

The GWR bridge is under lit, forbidding and ugly

The area for pedestrians and cyclists to wait to cross to the West Princes St. side of St George's road is cramped & unwelcoming.

This area is really difficult and time consuming to navigate and it could be made much more pedestrian-friendly.


