I am writing regarding the proposed car parking restrictions at Ibrox Stadium on event days. I would like to put a formal complaint against this proposal.

Lack of regular transport is a huge concern for me. I understand that Police Scotland's aim is to get supporters away from the area as quickly as possible, your proposed parking restrictions will encourage crowds to linger in the area longer and is a major Public Safety concern. I would assume that extra police would be required and that you have conducted a Risk Assessment.

By not allowing parking this will have a huge impact on my personal safety, leaving me feeling stranded, possibly among rival supporters, and am fearful of standing waiting on buses, and possibly having to walk trying to get home safely. This area is deprived and certainly does not feel a safe area to be walking through.

As a female it is not an ideal situation you are imposing on me.

The local business' do make a lot of money on match days from myself and fellow supporters which probably does keep them in business, I foresee that if this proposal goes ahead then small businesses will suffer.

I fail to understand your reasoning for this proposal except a money making exercise targeting Football Supporters who drive to the event. Is this not victimisation? Not only to supporters but to locals who are having to pay for permits to park in their own area. Shocking!!!



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

Under the present parking system I can be home within 30/40 minutes travelling within the safety of my own car but under the new proposals I will have to use public transport which is severely lacking and will double/treble my journey time and will also include having to walk through Glasgow city centre for onward travel which is totally unsatisfactory if actually feasible given the various kick off times.

Have the members of this committee fully consider the affect that this will have on women of my age group, indeed any age or gender group, to have to walk from much further afield to park or rely on public transport which may get me home by midnight on the occasions of evening kick offs. 

My father & daughter share a season ticket & whoever is attending travels with me by car. In my fathers case, I travel miles to collect him then return miles or so to the stadium. At 80 years old there is no prospect of him considering such a journey by public transport. Further, we require to park reasonably close to the stadium, usually in an significant distances. Even parking in areas out with the stadium environs & getting public transport for the last part of the journey would probably not be suitable for risk of jostling & being pushed, for example on the underground.
