The council is very proud of how committed all our staff are in helping to keep the city running at this time. In particular many of our home care heroes are going the extra mile to make sure our most vulnerable service users

are supported at the moment. In the East of the city, **Home Carer Pat Byrne** has been going out of his way to provide continuity and reassurance for his service users, during this uncertain time.

Since taking up his post last year Pat has already established a strong bond with his service users who have grown to trust and rely on him. He normally works a seven days on, seven days off shift pattern. However, as the workforce is lower at the moment due to 'shielding' and absence, some of his service users wouldn't have their usual alternate carer on his week off.

**Pat's manager Liane Brophy** said: "Some of Pat's service users were anxious about different carers coming into their homes and were struggling to adapt to the changes. So Pat selflessly volunteered to work some extra hours to cover his back to back colleague to make sure that his service users were seeing familiar faces. He is a hard worker and despite only starting with the service last year, he has already developed good relationships with his service users. We feel lucky to have such a dedicated carer in our team."

**Service user, Thomas** said "My wife is in a care home and with visiting restrictions in place due to the virus I haven't been able to see her. Pat has been a great support to me and I really appreciate him spending his time to help me through this difficult time."

**Pat** said "I really don't think I am doing anything special, it is such a difficult time and we all need to help each other through it. My manager is really grateful and I am just happy that I am able to help."

Thirty-four staff from across Neighbourhoods and Sustainability have done a fantastic job supporting colleagues in Bereavement Services to deliver a vital service at the council's cemeteries and crematoria.

**David McColl, Assistant Group Manager** explained: "At the beginning of the pandemic we appealed for volunteers from across the Service and we were delighted with the response. Staff from across a range of areas including trading standards, parks development, community payback, florists and others were quick to respond.

"We then offered our volunteers the opportunity to spend a day to sample the kind of work that is done. Small groups of two or three staff were invited to spend time at Linn and Daldowie crematoria, and others based in some of our cemeteries."

**David** continued: "After that our volunteers were offered full training to equip them for their new roles. They underwent the three day SQA Principles and Practise of the Cremation Process which is a training package specially developed to allow people to assist in all aspects of the cremation process.

"Thanks to the commitment and hard work of these staff we now have a team of trained and skilled volunteers to help make sure we can deliver a very vital service for the city."

**Derek Wells** is one of the volunteers who is making a difference. Derek works as a Natural Environment Officer within Parks Development based at Exchange House. Since volunteering he has been assisting his Bereavement Services colleagues with all aspects of the job at Linn and Daldowie Crematoriums.

**Derek** said: "For the past ten weeks I've done a variety of roles within our crematoriums. Initially I found some of the work a bit daunting but I quickly adapted to my new role. Staff and the management at both locations supported me and made me feel part of their small professional and knowledgeable team.

"The work is a far cry from my usual role but it's been rewarding and I'm glad I've been able to make a difference."



Some of the staff with the 'Thank You' balloons from one of the key worker families.


