Pupil Absence

Within St Bartholomew's Primary School good attendance is always encouraged. Parents are asked to advise if their son or daughter is going to be absent. This should be done as early as possible on the first day of absence. If the young person is going to be absent for some time, it would be helpful to know at the earliest opportunity. The school uses daily text messaging to inform parents and carers of absence if no contact is made. All unexplained absence is investigated by the school and appropriate action taken.

All calls must be made to the **Pupil Absence Reporting Line on 0141 287 0039.** The line is open between 08.00 -15.30 Monday to Friday.

Medical & Healthcare

The school nurse visits at various times during the year for routine health checks, vaccinations and medical examinations. Parents are kept informed by letter.

If a child becomes ill during the course of the school day, he/she may be required to be sent home. Please ensure that you keep the school informed of all contact details.

Parents should inform the school of any medical requirements relating to their child. If a child requires medication during the school day, parents must complete the appropriate medical form. This is available on request from the school office

Emergencies

We make every effort to maintain a full educational service, but on some occasions circumstances arise which lead to disruption. Schools may be affected by, for example, severe weather, temporary interruption of transport and power failures or difficulties with fuel supply.

In such cases, we shall do all we can to let you know about the details of our closure or re-opening by using letters, twitter, school app, website and the local media etc.

School Uniform

The school uniform is:

- White shirt
- School tie
- Navy trousers/skirt/pinafore
- Navy jumper or cardigan with school badge
- Black plimsoles for indoor wear
- Trainers for PE



Jumpers, cardigans, polo shirts with the school logo and ties are only available from BE School wear. Our uniform was agreed in consultation with pupils and parents. It is expected that all children attending St Bartholomew's Primary School will adhere to this dress code. Pupils should come to school dressed for the Scottish weather, as we often take learning outdoors e.g. waterproof jackets and appropriate footwear.

PE Kit

It is important that pupils come prepared to learn and for PE this requires appropriate clothing. All jewellery, including earrings, should be removed. Pupils who are not participating in PE must have a note or a medical certificate. Pupils who are unable to participate in practical PE should still bring their kit to allow them to assist in the lesson, wherever practical and possible, by refereeing, keeping scores or assisting with the distribution of equipment. This ensures that they are still able to take part in some way in the work of the class and do not miss out on the knowledge and understanding of the course.

There are forms of dress that are unacceptable in school, such as items of clothing which:

- Could cause rows/fall outs (such as football colours)
- Could cause offence (such as anti-religious symbolism or political slogans)
- Could cause health and safety difficulties (such as loose fitting clothing, high heels, jewellery)
- Could cause damage to flooring
- Carry advertising; particularly for alcohol or tobacco
- Could be used to inflict damage on other pupils

Clothing & Footwear Grants

Parents/Carers receiving Income Support, Job Seekers Allowance (Income Based), Working Tax Credit (with a total annual income of less than £15,860*), Housing Benefit, Council Tax Benefit or Universal Credit (where the total income is less than £7320) will normally be entitled to monetary grants for footwear and clothing for their children. School meals

Children who prefer to bring packed lunches will be accommodated in a suitable area.

All children in P1-5 are entitled to a free school meal.

If you plan to send your child/children to breakfast club, you should inform the staff of any medical dietary requirements.

Children and young people of parents/carers receiving Income Support, income-based Job Seekers Allowance, Working Tax Credit (where income is less than £7920*), Child Tax Credit only (where income is less than £16,500*), Universal Credit (where income is less than £7,320) and income-related Employment and Support Allowance are entitled to a free midday meal. The dinner school operated using <u>ParentPay</u>, pupils select their lunch choice in the morning during registration, although this can be selected at home the night before. No changes can be made once a selection has been made.

Parent Pay

Glasgow City Council have introduced an online payment solution called ParentPay into all primary and secondary schools across the city. ParentPay is used to pay for all school trips, concert tickets, uniforms, meals etc. and will enable us to remove all cash and cheques from schools.

We will send you an activation letter when you start school containing your activation details to enable you to set up your ParentPay account. If you have more than one child

at a ParentPay school/s you can add them to a single account, providing one login for all children at ParentPay schools. Please activate your account as soon as possible.

Parent Pay enables you to pay for trips and other items such as tickets, uniforms, clubs etc; offers a highly secure payment site; gives you a history of all the payments you have made; allows you to create a single account login across all your children that attend a ParentPay school; shows you all items available for payment relevant to each of your children; emails a receipt of your payment to the email address you register; and offers you the ability to set automated payment reminders.

Transport

The education authority has a policy of providing free transport to all pupils who live out with a certain radius from their local school by the recognised shortest walking route. This means that the provision of transport could be reviewed at any time. Parents/Carers who consider they are eligible can apply online at https://www.glasgow.gov.uk/index.aspx?articleid=17882

Transfer from Primary to Secondary School

Children and young people normally transfer between the ages of 11 ½ and 12 ½, so that they will have the opportunity to complete at least 4 years of secondary education. Parents and carers will be informed of the school arrangements no later than December of P7.

Open Door Policy – We welcome our parents/ carers into the school and the Senior Leadership Team are available for all parents and carers providing they are not teaching or in another meeting. Please telephone the school to request a member of the SLT to return your call or to arrange an appointment. We are glad to be opening our doors again following Covid, and have lots of opportunities scheduled this year for parents and guardians to come into the building to interact with teachers and pupils, we look forward to working with you all again.

Newsletters & Dates for the Diary – will be sent out on a regular basis to keep parents informed about the life and work of the school. Paper copies are now limited and most information is now sent via email.

Letters – further information which requires a response may be sent out in letter form.

Meetings – Parents' evenings are scheduled for January/February and will provide an opportunity to discuss your child's development and progress with the class teacher. There will be various opportunities throughout the year when parents can discuss their child's progress with the class teacher and view the child's work such as workshops and class assemblies. Teachers also continue to utilise our online platforms such as Twitter, the school website, Seesaw, Showbie and the school newsletter to keep our parents informed.

Report Cards- We issue Interim Report Cards in November followed by the end of year Report Cards in June.

Emergency Contact Information

At the start of each school session, parents will be issued with the annual data check form. Please ensure that this is completed and returned to the school. It is also important that you tell us if there are changes to your telephone number(s) or to those of your emergency contacts.

Data Protection – use of information about children and parents/carers

We collect information about children attending school (and also about parents/carers, emergency contacts etc. provided in the annual data check) to allow us to carry out the Council's functions as the education authority for the City of Glasgow. This may sometimes involve releasing personal information to other agencies and other parts of the Council, particularly in relation to child protection issues or criminal investigations, and it may also be used for research purposes (see the link below for more details regarding this).

Curriculum

Curriculum for Excellence has been introduced to raise standards of learning and teaching for all 3 to 18 year olds. It aims to help prepare children and young people with the knowledge and skills they need in a fast changing world. As part of Curriculum for Excellence all children from pre-school to the end of S3 will receive a rounded education known as a Broad General Education (BGE). Curriculum for Excellence is all about bringing real life into the classroom and taking lessons beyond it.

Through the experiences we provide at St Bartholomew's Primary School we want our children to become Successful Learners, Confident Individuals, Responsible Citizens and Effective Contributors. We are committed to providing children with a broad general education and focus on eight curriculum areas.

<u>Expressive Arts:</u> The inspiration and power of the arts play a vital role in enabling our children and young people to enhance their creative talent and develop their artistic skills. The confidence built through Expressive Arts has tremendous spin-offs for confidence in learning generally. This year we are delighted to have Baby Strings

operating in the school providing our learners with instrumental tuition for P2-P7 and initial music inputs in P1. We will be celebrating the success of our talented individuals with a Musician of the Month awards.

<u>Health and Wellbeing:</u> Learning in health and wellbeing ensures that children and young people develop the knowledge, understanding and skills which they need now and in the future to help them with their physical, emotional and social wellbeing.

<u>Science:</u> Science and its practical application in healthcare and industry is central to our economic future, for our health and wellbeing as individuals and as a society.

<u>Social Studies:</u> Through social studies, children and young people develop their understanding of the world by learning about other places, societies and people, both past and present, their beliefs and values

Religious Education:

Religious Education is a core subject in all schools and provision is made for this in our school curriculum. We follow the 'This Is Our Faith' programme and Pupils receive RE lessons on a daily basis and participate in liturgical and prayer services throughout the year. Presently our school chaplain is Fr. Ian Bathgate. The school attends Saint Bartholomew's Church for First Friday Mass and Lenten/Advent Services.

Our children are prepared and presented for the Sacraments at the appropriate level of development:

P3 Sacrament of Reconciliation.

P4 Sacrament of Holy Eucharist.

P7 Sacrament of Confirmation

Preparation for the Sacraments is seen as a commitment from home, parish and school. It is the responsibility of parents to contact the priest of the parish in which they live to request that their child may be presented for the Sacraments.



<u>Literacy and Languages:</u> Learning to listen, talk, read and write provides key skills for learning life and work. Literacy extends beyond working with traditional printed text to include audio and other forms of visual text, and addresses a wide range of genre. This year we have a Literacy Leader of learning who will be supporting the delivery of this aspect of the curriculum ensuring pupils across the school reach their full potential in Literacy. Knowing other languages and understanding other cultures, is a 21st century skill set for students as they prepare to live and work in a global society. In addition, in St Bartholomew's all pupils receive Spanish lessons.

Numeracy and Mathematics: Numeracy and Mathematics equips us with the skills we need to calculate, interpret and analyse information, simplify and solve problems, assess risk and make informed decisions – all key life skills. Each month we celebrate our pupils' success in Maths and Numeracy with our Mathematician of the Month award.

<u>Technologies:</u> The range of subjects in technical education has changed significantly over the last two decades and now includes craft, design, engineering and graphics. This subject helps illustrate the application of science in the world.

There will be opportunities throughout the year for parents and carers to learn more about aspects of the curriculum and to be consulted about significant changes if appropriate.

Assessment & Reporting

All children are assessed both formally and informally throughout the year. This allows children and their teachers to identify their strengths and areas for improvement. A variety of assessment methods are used to enable staff to pass on information to parents about the progress of their child. Assessment records are kept by the class teacher and form the basis of discussion at Parents' Evenings in February. An annual report is sent to parents towards the end of each school year.

If you have any concerns about your child's progress do not hesitate to contact the school.

Support for Pupils

The school has a duty to ensure that all pupils have equal access to the curriculum, with appropriate support for their needs if required. This applies to the content of lessons, teaching strategies and minor adaptations to the school environment. There are a wide range of factors which may act as a barrier to learning. We are committed to working closely with parents and carers to ensure that they are fully involved in any decisions about support for their children's needs.

Nurturing City

The Glasgow City Council vision 'towards the nurturing city', puts building positive, trusting relationships at the core of our work. On an annual basis, we prepare a Standards and Quality report which highlights our progress in key curricular areas such as literacy, numeracy and health & wellbeing. Our annual priorities for improvement are detailed in our School Improvement Plan which is discussed with our Parent Council. Promoting Positive Behaviour


The approach within St Bartholomew's Primary School is to build a positive ethos that demonstrates care and respect for all. Positive behaviour is recognised and celebrated. Living the values is celebrated through Rights Respecting Time each week and the Class of the Week/Head Teacher Weekly Awards/Head Teacher's Lunch/Year Star Challenge.

The highest standards of behaviour are expected of pupils at all times. Where this is not the case, a variety of sanctions are used. Parents are asked to co-operate with the school in encouraging a sense of responsibility and good behaviour choices in their children.

School House System

We have four houses, Baird, Bell, Fleming and Watt, named after the famous Scottish inventors. Every pupil will be allocated a house, led by our Captains and Vice Captains from Primary 7. Pupils will earn their house points for good work, behaviour and participation, thus linking to our promoting positive behaviour strategy. Everyone has the same goals, expectations and rules to follow. Pupils will compete in their houses during fun activities throughout the school year.

The house with the most points at the end of the year will win the St Bartholomew's House Cup!



Home Learning

Continuing to learn at home helps children to achieve more and is a vital part of our partnership with parents. Please check your child's schoolbag for communication about home learning and specific tasks, tasks will primarily be set online through their class Seesaw/Showbie. This is to help in reducing paper copies being printed as we make progress in continuing to retain our Eco Schools status. 
Parent Council
