Drummore Primary is part of Drumchapel Learning Community. A full list of the educational establishments within this community can be found on our website. Drummore staff have worked with colleagues from other schools to develop priorities for our Learning Community and participated in a range of professional development activities to meet these priorities.

The school has many positive links within the local community. These links are used to enhance the children's overall learning experience and also to contribute to the local community. A variety of shared activities among neighbouring schools are helping children to communicate and learn alongside other children from out with their own school. Our infant classes have experienced outdoor natural play sessions such as 'Mud-pie Kitchen' with our neighbouring nursery. Children and staff from Drummore and the community have been involved in creating Local Community Gardens and Drummore children have engaged in Forest School learning with our neighbouring school. These learning experiences are helping to break down barriers of exclusion while promoting inclusion and fostering shared values towards sustainable practices.

Drummore Primary School also works closely with the Active Schools Co-ordinator to develop a range of sporting activities during and outside the school such as the Drumchapel Football Festival, Gymnastics, Dance, Tae Kwon Do and our multi-sport After School Club. Our pupils work with children from Drumchapel High School who are undertaking their Sport and Dance Leader Awards.

Enrolment

The School Day

P1 children will remain in school until 15.15 hours from the August starting date.

Pupil Absence

Within Drummore Primary good attendance is encouraged at all times. Parents are asked to inform the school if their child is going to be absent. This should be done before 9.30 on the first day of absence. If the child is going to be absent for some time, it would be helpful to know at the earliest opportunity. The school will phone parents to gain information on their child's absence if no contact is made. All unexplained absence is investigated by the school and appropriate action is taken.

Medical & Healthcare

If a child becomes ill during the course of the school day, he/she may require to be sent home. Please ensure that you keep the school informed of <u>all</u> contact details.

Parents should inform the school of any medical requirements relating to their child. If a child requires medication during the school day, parents must complete the appropriate medical form. This is available on request from the school office.

We have a school doctor and a school nurse who visit the school to carry out standard medical tests and immunisation programmes with parental consent. You will be informed of these at the appropriate times. Dental inspections are also carried out and once again you will be informed of this.

We have two First Aiders in the school who are always on hand to treat minor bumps and bruises etc. If a child has had a minor accident, a letter detailing the injury will be sent home with the child.

Emergencies

We make every effort to maintain a full educational service, but on some occasions circumstances arise which lead to disruption. Schools may be affected by, for example, severe weather, temporary interruption of transport, power failures or difficulties of fuel supply.

In such cases, we shall do all we can to let you know about the details of our closure or re-opening by using letters and the local media etc.

School Uniform

The school uniform is:

- Black sweatshirt
- Yellow polo shirt
- Black trousers/skirt
- Black fleece
- P.E. kit yellow t-shirt, black shorts, black sandshoes

Sweatshirts, polo shirts, fleece and t-shirts with the school logo are available for purchase at the school office. It is expected that all children attending Drummore Primary will adhere to this dress code.

PE Kit

It is important that pupils come prepared to learn and for PE this requires appropriate clothing. All jewellery should be removed. Pupils who are not participating in PE must have a note or a medical certificate. Pupils who are unable to participate in practical PE should still bring their kit to allow them to assist in the lesson by refereeing, keeping scores or assisting with the distribution of equipment. This ensures that they are still able to take part in some way in the work of the class and do not miss out on the knowledge and understanding of the lessons.

There are forms of dress that are unacceptable in school, such as items of clothing which:

- Potentially encourage factions (such as football colours)
- Could cause offence (such as anti-religious symbolism or political slogans)
- Could cause health and safety difficulties (such as loose fitting clothing, jewellery)
- Could cause damage to flooring
- Carry advertising particularly for alcohol or tobacco
- Could be used to inflict damage on other pupils

Clothing & Footwear Grants

Parents/Carers receiving Income Support, Job Seekers Allowance (Income Based), Working Tax Credit (with a total annual income of less than £15,050*), Housing Benefit, or Council Tax Benefit will normally be entitled to monetary grants for footwear and clothing for their children. School meals

Our school provides a lunch service which offers a variety of meals and snacks. Special diets for children with medical requirements can be provided. Please inform the Headteacher.

Children who prefer to bring packed lunches are accommodated in the dining hall.

All children in Primary one to four are entitled to a free school meal. Children and young people of parents/carers receiving Income Support, income-based Job Seekers Allowance, Working Tax Credit (where income is less than £6,420), Child Tax Credit only (where income is less than £16,010*) and income-related Employment and Support Allowance are entitled to a free midday meal. Transport

All children attending Drummore Primary and resident within the City of Glasgow are brought to school on free transport and will be accompanied by an escort on the bus or taxi. The bus will only wait for a **maximum** of three minutes at each pick-up/drop-off point. Transfer from Primary to Secondary School

Children and young people normally transfer between the ages of 11 ½ and 12 ½, so that they will have the opportunity to complete at least 4 years of secondary education. Various options will be explored to ensure that children attend an establishment that best meets their educational needs. Options may include a placement at a Secondary School for children with Additional Learning Needs, a mainstream Secondary School or a supported provision within a mainstream school. Parents and carers will meet with school staff and professionals from relevant agencies in Primary 6 to discuss the best possible placement for each individual pupil.

Communication with Parents

At Drummore Primary we use a variety of ways to keep in touch:

Open Door Policy – the senior leadership team are available for all parents and carers at any time providing they are not teaching or in another meeting. Please either pop in to the school office or phone for an appointment.

Class Diaries – will let parents know what homework has been set and is also used to communicate between the class teacher and parents.

Newsletters – will be sent out on a regular basis to keep parents informed about the work of the school.

Letters – further information which requires a response may be sent out in letter form.

Text Messaging – You may also receive text reminders about events/school closures etc.

School website – will contain a great deal of information about the school. It is a good idea to check this regularly.

Meetings - Parents and carers are welcome in the school to discuss any aspect of their child's development and progress. To avoid disappointment, it is advisable to make an appointment. There are various opportunities throughout the year when parents can discuss their child's progress with the class teacher and view the child's work.

Parents and carers are welcome at other events throughout the school year e.g. workshops, information evenings, class performances, religious and other assemblies. The school newsletter and website will keep you informed.

Emergency Contact Information

At the start of each school session, parents will be issued with the annual data check form. Please ensure that this is completed and returned to the school. It is also important that you let us know if there are changes to your telephone number(s) or to those of your emergency contacts throughout the year.

Data Protection – use of information about children and parents/carers

We collect information about children attending school (and also about parents/carers, emergency contacts etc. provided in the annual data check) to allow us to carry out the Council's functions as the education authority for the City of Glasgow. This may sometimes involve releasing personal information to other agencies and other parts of the Council, particularly in relation to child protection issues or criminal investigations, and it may also be used for research purposes (see the link below for more details regarding this).

Information held by the school is, in legal terms, processed by Glasgow City Council. The Council is registered as a data controller under the Data Protection Act 1998 (number Z4871657) and all personal data is treated as confidential and used only in accordance with the Data Protection Act and the Information Use and Privacy Policy approved by the City Council. Curriculum

Curriculum for Excellence 3-18

Curriculum for Excellence has been introduced to raise standards of learning and teaching for all 3 to 18 year olds. It aims to help prepare children and young people with the knowledge and skills they need in a fast changing world. As part of Curriculum for Excellence all children from pre-school to the end of S3 will receive a rounded education known as a Broad General Education (BGE). Curriculum for Excellence is all about bringing real life into the classroom and taking lessons beyond it. Through the experiences we provide at Drummore Primary we want our children to become Successful Learners, Confident Individuals, Responsible Citizens and Effective Contributors. We are committed to providing children with a broad general education and focus on eight curriculum areas:

Expressive Arts	Health & Wellbeing	Literacy and English	Mathematics
Religious & Moral	Sciences	Social Studies	Technologies

Progress in learning is indicated through curriculum levels as detailed below.

Early	The pre-school years and P1 or later

Expressive arts: The inspiration and power of the arts play a vital role in enabling our children and young people to enhance their creative talent and develop their artistic skills.

Health and wellbeing: Learning in health and wellbeing ensures that children and young people develop the knowledge, understanding and skills which they need now and in the future to help them with their physical, emotional and social wellbeing. All of our teachers are trained in how to teach our Sexual Health and Relationship Education Programme (SHRE). Parents wishing further information on this should contact Peter Calderwood (Depute Head) at the school.

Science: Science and its practical application in healthcare and industry is central to our economic future, for our health and wellbeing as individuals and as a society. Our school garden provides a meaningful context for many aspects of the science curriculum. There are always lots to do in our school garden so if any parents are willing to lend a 'green fingered' hand we would love to hear from you!

Social Studies: Through social studies, children and young people develop their understanding of the world by learning about other people and places both past and present, societies, their beliefs and values.

Religious and moral education: Religious and moral education includes learning about Christianity, Islam and other world religions, and supports the development of beliefs and values.

Literacy and English Language: Language is at the core of thinking. We reflect, communicate and develop ideas through language. Literacy offers an essential passport to learning, helping children and young people to achieve to the full and be ready for active involvement in society and work.

Mathematics: Mathematics equips us with the skills we need to interpret and analyse information, simplify and solve problems, assess risk and make informed decisions.

Technologies: The range of subjects in technical education has changed significantly over the last two decades and now includes craft, design, engineering and graphics.

Each child will also have a Wellbeing Assessment Plan, which focuses on meeting the children's needs in relation to the wellbeing indicators: Safe, Healthy, Achieving, Nurtured, Active, Responsible, Respected and Included. The Wellbeing Assessment Plan includes the Additional Support Plan (ASP) where specific targets are set mainly in the areas of Health and Wellbeing and Literacy. These targets are decided each year in consultation with parents, staff and relevant agencies during a Target Setting meeting.

School policy which encourages the use of local as well as the wider community facilities means that there are weekly class visits to places of interest and educational significance e.g. swimming at Drumchapel Pool, visits to Linn Park Adventure Ground and visits to the local woods. Pupils also go to the local shops and community centre to increase their knowledge, develop their self-confidence, independence and communication skills.

Our pupils also have the opportunity to participate in a range of sporting and outdoor activities. Drumchapel Table Tennis Club provides coaching in the school and several of our pupils have joined the club and had the opportunity to compete in local and national tournaments.

The primary 7 pupils participate in an annual residential trip to an outdoor centre. This year the children went to Blairvadach Outdoor Centre (www.blairvadach.org.uk) over a weekend where they participated in activities such as hill walking, mountain biking, rock climbing, assault course and orienteering.

Religious Observance

Our school is fortunate to have a close link with the local church. The minister assists with the Christianity element of Religious and Moral Education and provides opportunities for religious observance. Parents have the right to withdraw their child from religious observance and should inform the school in writing.

Assessment & Reporting

All children are assessed both formally and informally throughout the year. This allows children and their teachers to identify their strengths and areas for improvement. A variety of assessment methods are used to enable staff to pass on information to parents about the progress of their child. Assessment records are kept by the class teacher and form the basis of discussion at Parents' Evenings of which there are three a year. An annual report is sent to parents towards the end of each school year. Parents will be contacted if school staff have concerns that need to be discussed and likewise if you have any concerns about your child's progress do not hesitate to contact the school.

Pupil Profiles

Every child leaving primary school in Scotland has their key achievements in school, at home and in the community documented within a P7 profile. The content of the profile is decided by the young person (where appropriate). The profile is a positive record of their achievements and emphasis their strengths. The profile provides a valuable way for learners to share valuable information about their achievements with their parents and teachers in secondary school.

Support for Pupils

The school has a duty to ensure that all pupils have equal access to the curriculum, with appropriate support for their needs put in place if and when required. This applies to the content of lessons, teaching strategies and minor adaptations to the school environment. There are a wide range of factors which may act as a barrier to learning. We are committed to working closely with parents and carers to ensure that they are fully involved in any decisions about support for their children's needs. Promoting Positive Behaviour

Children's Rights as outlined in the UNCRC (United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child) are fundamental to a good school ethos. Adults in our school will work with children to ensure they are aware of their rights and fully respect the rights of others. Therefore, the approach within Drummore Primary is to build a positive ethos that demonstrates care and respect for all. Positive behaviour is recognised and celebrated through Golden Time treats, awards at assemblies and certificates sent home to parents etc. Children earn points in class for good work, for trying hard, for behaving well and for being considerate to others.

The highest standards of behaviour are expected of pupils at all times. Where this is not the case, a variety of sanctions are used. Parents are asked to co-operate with the school in encouraging a sense of responsibility and good behaviour in their children.

All children in Glasgow's educational establishments have an entitlement to work (and play) in a learning environment in which they feel valued, respected and safe and are free from all forms of abuse, bullying or discrimination.
