Citizens Asked to Step Forward to Volunteer for Glasgow 850

Volunteers of all ages and backgrounds are being sought to support the celebrations around Glasgow 850's yearlong programme throughout 2025.

The Glasgow 850 Volunteer and Employability programme will offer Glaswegians a unique opportunity to play a key part in the city's birthday year, with roles to support the smooth running of its main events and local community projects.

In a break from the conventional volunteer programmes that recruits and trains people for specific roles, as part of a one-time event, the Glasgow 850 scheme will ask people to register to hear about a rolling programme of volunteer and learning opportunities, throughout the anniversary year.

Developed in conjunction with Volunteer Glasgow, this approach to volunteering creates an inclusive and rewarding experience for participants. It allows them to engage in a range of activities at their own pace, offering greater flexibility and choice than traditional volunteer schemes.

In registering their interest, volunteers will have the chance to be at the heart of Glasgow's 850 celebrations by supporting the signature activities including a three day music event; Clyde Chorus, People's Palace pop-up exhibition and Taste the Place food trail.

In addition to these flagship events, there will be a chance for volunteers to get involved in events run by Glasgow 850 Festival Fund recipients and locally based roles with community organisations, ensuring that participants can contribute in ways that best suit their interests and availability.




The City Centre Performance Dashboard - Data offers a valuable insight into Glasgow City Centre

The City Centre Performance Dashboard is a joint venture between Glasgow City Council and the Chamber of Commerce. It uses data from a variety of sources to create a narrative about the economic health and vibrancy of the city centre. The dashboard is being developed and updated by GCC's Data team.

Everyone in the council can access it, and it offers great insights into the city centre. The City Centre Strategy team has been using it to monitor the city centre's health and measure the impact of key events – such as the UCI Championships or the Banksy exhibition on the city centre, as well as to define the priorities the team should focus on.

It can give you information about footfall, retail spend, public and private transport, tourism, and many other key metrics. For example, did you know that the day which had the highest footfall this year was the 5 October? Or that in September, international arrivals into Glasgow were up 13% on last year? Are you looking to find out if Glasgow is outperforming Edinburgh in terms of sales or if car usage is declining in the city centre?



All of this information can be found on the dashboard and it will give you and your team a better understanding of our city centre. If the number in the dial is more than 100 then we have improved on last

vear, if it is lower then we have not

New Podcast Marks 20 Years of ASSIST

A new podcast celebrates a Glasgow City Council run service which has helped thousands of domestic abuse victims over the past 20 years.

Every eight minutes, Police Scotland deal with a report of domestic abuse and every year, an average of nine people are killed in domestic homicides in this country.

Research has shown that advocacy and support are the biggest factors in minimising trauma and enhancing feelings of safety for victims and witnesses. ASSIST supports victims of domestic abuse and their children through the court system when their alleged abuser is being prosecuted.

Run by Glasgow City Council, ASSIST is the biggest service of its type in Scotland. It is funded by the Scotlish Government and helps people from Argyll and Bute; Ayrshire (East, North and South); Dumfries and Galloway; Glasgow; Dunbartonshire (East and West); Inverclyde; Lanarkshire (North and South) and Renfrewshire (including East Renfrewshire).

ASSIST guides victims through the legal system , ensuring they are safe and supported throughout proceedings. Specialist staff do everything from explaining legal terms to drawing up safety plans to increase victims' safety (particularly when the accused is on bail).

The ASSIST@20 podcast also marks 20 years of Glasgow's dedicated domestic abuse court and recognises the close partnership working between ASSIST, the Procurator Fiscal Service and Police Scotland to improve the court experience for victims.

A panel of experts feature on the podcast, including Mhairi McGowan who managed ASSIST from 2005 to 2019 and is now an independent violence against women and girls consultant; Fiona McMullen, Operations Manager at ASSIST and one of the first advocacy workers; Emma Forbes, Lead National Prosecutor for Domestic Abuse, who was the first prosecutor in Glasgow's domestic abuse court and Fil Capaldi, a retired Detective Superintendent from Police Scotland, who was looking after domestic abuse in 2004.

The expertise of staff and the experiences of service users also help inform and advise decision-makers.

The podcast was funded by the University of Edinburgh to highlight the life changing nature of ASSISTS'

NRS Welcomes our new Director of Service Delivery, Jenny O'Hagan

After starting the newly formed position of Director of Service Delivery within Neighbourhoods, Regenerations and Sustainability on Monday 28 October, the Loop caught up with Jenny O'Hagan:

Tell us a bit about your Career Background?

I am a Chartered Accountant, who has worked within Local Government at a senior level for over 30 years, after training in the private sector. I have carried out various roles, across a range of departments, building lots of networks and friendships along the way. My roles have largely been within the Finance and the Transformation/business change field but moved from the dark arts of Finance to become Divisional Director of Operations in April 2022, with responsibility for leading approximately 2000 staff across frontline, professional and management roles across Refuse and Waste, Public Health, Parks, Events and Community Safety, which was quite a change and I have absolutely loved the challenges that brought.



Every day I am proud of having the opportunity to work with such talented staff to deliver services that are used by everyone across the City, being able to make a positive difference to influence how best to deliver these services in this role by having the right people in the right roles makes me extremely proud.

What do you foresee being the biggest challenge within your role?

The biggest challenge is undoubtedly dealing with the unprecedented financial challenges, with increased expectation of service delivery, which puts constraints on resources, so I relish the opportunity to bring innovative solutions to delivering services differently, with input, engagement and buy-in from staff across the service.

What is an interesting fact about yourself?

I swim over 100,000m every year in the sea all year round (the colder the better) to improve my health and wellbeing, which many of you may already know. I was also brought up on a Deer Farm.

NRS Events Team Spotlight

Following another busy summer of events, we spoke to the NRS Events Team to find out all the hard work that goes into making Glasgow an events powerhouse all year round, as well as what events we can look forward to in the future:

What events are the Council currently facilitating?

Every year, the NRS Events Team helps to facilitate in excess of 770 activities across its parks, precincts, and open spaces. This diverse range of events spans from large-scale gatherings such as the TRNSMT Music Festival, Summer Sessions, and Melting Pot concerts, to the GlasGLOW light and sound experience, the Multi-Cultural Arts Festival MELA, physical challenge events like the Great Scottish Run and Men and Women's 10k, weekly park runs, various small-scale community events, and assembly or dispersal points for processions, protests, and marches.

What work needs to go into planning and running large scale events across the city?

While the event organiser is responsible for the operations of the event, NRS Events play a crucial role in ensuring fair and safe use of the space and that organisers are complying with current legislation. Our responsibilities include reviewing all Risk Assessments to ensure that proper mitigating actions have been taken to eliminate or reduce any identified risks. We ensure that adequate Public Liability Insurance coverage exceeding the minimum requirement is in place, along with detailed Event and Location Plans. As a condition of use, we work with internal stakeholders such Licensing, Environmental Health and Building Control to ensure event compliance. As part of our broader city-wide work, we actively prevent event clashes and alleviate undue strain on essential services within the Glasgow City Council and external partners like Police Scotland or Scottish Fire and Rescue. We ensure the disruption to the city is kept to a minimum through our expertise in the city road network and our commitment to efficient coordination and risk management guarantees successful and harmonious event execution.

What the most challenging and exciting event you have put together?

The Santa Dash is a firm team favourite, an exciting event to work on and to deliver. There was a lot of planning and organising involved and the team all came together with their allocated sections to deliver a fun and exciting event. Leading up to the event staff would tend the Pop Up Shop where participants would come to collect their run pack with t-shirt, run number and route information. On the day, the team had their allocated positions, which included start line, muster point, route, finish line and prize station. Each role having a responsibility and a team to help manage the day. While some of our role is office based and

engaging more with event organisers it is good to get some customer contact time. Being able to promote the race further within the Pop Up Shop and engaging with the public was always a favourite part of the process. Helping a charity like the Beatson, which has touched so many lives with the people of Glasgow, makes all the hard work worth it.

What makes Glasgow such an attractive and effective location for large scale events?

Glasgow is the UK's first UNESCO City of Music. Glasgow is well known for being one of the world's most friendliest cities to visit. Music artists often talk about Glaswegian crowds being the best, and we agree. With so much to offer to visitors to the city it is no wonder that Event Organisers chose to come to Glasgow. Not only do they have the opportunity to access various iconic locations throughout the city to place their event, but visitors get so much more with top class bars, restaurants and entertainment venues, along with various competitive socialising venues, a plethora of hotels and accommodation and with the top music locations in Scotland including parks in Glasgow that host music events in the summer, including Kelvingrove Park, Glasgow Green, Queen's Park Arena, and Bellahouston Park we are building a fantastic reputation for Gigs in Glasgow. The support from NRS Events Team and colleagues in other sections has created a process which is clear and streamlined when it comes to the organisation of the events.

What upcoming events are you involved in that staff can attend?

With next year (2025) being a celebration of Glasgow turning 850, there will be various pop- up events along with the return of our annual events. Some of the free to attend events include MELA, various open days and lots of community events sprinkled around the city, there will be a lot to choose from.
