Updated NRS Leadership Structure

The updated NRS Leadership and Senior Management tree is now available for staff to access.

This follows the recent appointment of Jenny O'Hagan to the role of Director of Service Delivery, Martin Heath to Roads and Transportation and Ben Wilson to Development and Regeneration. It also reflects the recent departures within the Senior Management Team including Andy Waddell, Ian Roberston, Deborah Paton, Kenny Markwick, Gary Walker and Christine Francis.

These appointments come with some changes to the divisions and responsibilities held by each service which staff should note:

- The division previously led by Jenny has been retitled from "Operations" to "Neighbourhoods and Communities" and external recruitment for this position is underway
- Within Neighbourhoods and Communities, there has been a reconfiguration of responsibilities
- David McCulloch will lead Waste and Fleet Management; this includes Waste Strategy, Recycling, Commercial and Bulk
- Denise Hamilton will lead Communities, Events and Regulatory Services. Denise is also the Council's SRO (Senior Responsible Officer) for the 2026 Commonwealth Games
- The vacant Head of Service for "Environmental Operations" will be responsible for Domestic Refuse Collection, Streetscene and Parks Operations. External recruitment for this position is underway
- Within the Roads and Transportation Division, the updates are as follows
- Recruitment for the vacant Head of Service with responsibility for Infrastructure Asset Management and Head of Service with responsibility for Sustainable Transport, Traffic and Parking Operations began on Friday 29 November 2024
- Jonathan Brown, Head of Service with responsibility for City Deal will transfer to this division

NRS Delivers Rejuvenated Linn Crematorium

Following the completion of improvement works at Daldowie, Linn Crematorium has now been brought up to standard following extensive works to improve its functionality, appearance and sustainability. Led by our multi-disciplinary design team in NRS Property and Consultancy Services, working with Bereavement Services and City Building, the completion of phase 1 of this project delivers on a key commitment by NRS to upgrade the city's crematoria.

Opened in 1962, this category B listed Modernist building sits on an expansive hillside near the edge of Glasgow, bordered by a park and woodlands. With long winding driveways up either side, stained glass and screening in its two chapels and beautiful gardens of remembrance, this beautifully imposing building is one of Glasgow's most unique assets.

At its core this is an environmental project, which has addressed historic issues with the building while ensuring it can operate as a quality and sustainable facility for generations to come. The building received a

full electrical upgrade while extensive work was carried out on the interior and exterior, ensuring the building is structurally sound and watertight while refurbing the main chamber and waiting rooms, helping to bring out the beauty of its ambitious design. Primarily, a state-of-the-art heat recovery system has been installed with new radiators throughout the building. This recovery system will not only drastically reduce Council costs to heat the building but will also ensure that the facility can sustainably operate long into the future.

CBC Project Manager Martin Bredin had the following to say on the project:

"City Building took great pride in being part of the refurbishment works at Linn Crematorium. The project had many challenges as is often the case with old historical buildings but to give it the upgrade it required and to see it again functioning and providing a service to the people of Glasgow is the most pleasing feeling. It was a tight timescale to have the phase 1 works complete and a real joint effort from all involved was required to make sure it was handed back to the client's satisfaction."

The next phase of work will include the completion of refurbishment works to the smaller of the two chapels. The building's audio and visual capabilities will also be improved, allowing the chapels to stream services in higher quality, further enhancing the appeal of this great facility. The phased approach enables work on the back of house to continue behind the scenes while allowing bereavement services to open again to the public in time for Christmas, giving back an upgraded asset in a timely manner.

Already making an impact, an open day was held on Monday 25 November which saw many of the city's funeral directors invited for a tour. The response and feedback from attendees was incredibly positive and will contribute to the improvement of the image and reputation of the building. It has been a very successful project which has once again made Linn Crematorium a special building with great appeal.



Best Bar None Host Record Event

On 13 November, The NRS City Centre Team hosted the annual Best Bar None Glasgow Awards which was a record breaking year for participation.

Taking place in the Grand Central Hotel, entries soared to record numbers this year and 106 venues were given awards

Each pub, club and bar is inspected ahead of the awards by four independent assessors. They were judged on their efforts in Prevention of Crime & Disorder, Securing Public Safety, Prevention of Public Nuisance, Promotion of Public Health and the Protection of Children from Harm.

Speaking to the Glasgow Evening Times, Lise Fisher of NRS said:

"It is great to see so many city venues striving to achieve excellence in customer safety and providing an enjoyable experience for customers. The results are a true testament to the ongoing hard work and dedication of licensees and their staff across the city."

"Glasgow's licensees are currently preparing for the festive season, and customers should look out for the distinctive BBN Glasgow awards on display in winning venues."

Retirement Spotlight for Colin Houston

Retiring on Christmas eve, Colin Houston will leave the Planning and Building Standards team after several years of positively influencing developments across Glasgow. We caught up with Colin on his time in the Council, his plans for retirement and a recently awarded Badge of Honour.

When did you start in the Council and what has been a highlight in that time?

I started working for Glasgow city Council in May 2018. Before this, I had always worked in private practice; initially starting my career as an architect before going to work for a series of housing developers. When I joined the City Design team and started looking after residential projects my new approach to work made me take the view that I was a poacher turned game keeper. I found this to be very beneficial as I could understand the approach taken my developers and use this knowledge to better influence positive change.



My role within City Design requires me to vet the design aspects of building projects, including assessing any environmental impacts, how the project fits within its surroundings and even looking to the detail where left unconsidered. If something within the design can be improved we will make these recommendations and ask the applicant to consider an alternative approach. It's all about fine tuning projects to make them as good as can be. It's always easy to choose a big project as a career highlight, but for me the enjoyment has always been from walking away from a project and seeing that it has been improved. Weather a small house extension or a 20 storey city block, if City Design can get the applicant to take on board improvements that is the satisfaction. Secondly, knowing that an application not only develops to an approval, but is a viable solution that turns into bricks and mortar.

At the recent Scottish Cycling Conference and Awards you received the highest available accolade, the Badge of Honour, for your contribution to downhill mountain biking. Can you tell us about your work and what attracts you to the hobby?

I was setup by someone on my committee! I got involved in downhill racing 20 years ago because my son wanted to try it out. At my sons first race I got chatting to the organisers and they invited me to have a shot with the timing. After two races they asked me to join the committee and I've been there ever since. I have been the chairman of the Scottish Downhill Association for 15 years and help organise 6 races a year and running our own Scottish Series. This year we are also hosting the British Cycling National Championships and a UCI round both on the World Cup track at Fort William.

I have always liked to go away for weekends be involved in different projects and activities. I got involved in the outdoors cause my father was the manager of the outdoors shop Blacks of Greenock and it has always stuck with me. So much so that when we got married my wife asked if we could try going on holiday without a tent

I don't just volunteer my time in downhill racing, I'm also a National Grade ski patroller at Glencoe for the past 40 years and volunteer on the board of the British Association of Ski Patrollers.

What are your plans for retirement?

I'll be returning to Glen Coe soon to carry out ski patrol over the weekends. My wife and two sons are also involved so during winter we are all up there together. We have a hut in Rannoch Moor which only recently got lighting and electricity. It's a stark contrast from living life in the city during the week, but being outdoors has always been a big part of our family makeup growing up, and its great to continue that together to this day. Aside from continuing with the biking I will be more than busy Looking after my grandkids and possibly even doing some sailing with the addition of a family boat.

Any words of advice for someone just starting their career in the Council?

I think anyone coming in should make the most of what the council offer as a career opportunity and the potential training. Theres a tendency for people to come in and do their job and not be aware of what's available to them. There are loads of things the council can offer, explore it as much as you can and take advantage of it!
